ABOUT THE COMMISSION

In 1972, Saskatchewan established its first independent commission to delimit provincial electoral boundaries. For the previous 67 years of the province's history, the Legislative Assembly set provincial electoral boundaries.

The current commission, established on April 27, 2022 under *The Boundaries Commission Act, 1993* is the seventh provincial boundaries commission.

The Act specifies that the Commission must recommend boundaries for the 59 constituencies south of the line that divides them from the two northern constituencies, Athabasca and Cumberland.

The Commission is guided in its work by the principle that every vote should bear an equal value to the extent practical, subject to those variations considered necessary because of sparsity, density, or relative rates of growth; accessibility, size, shape, or physical features of regions; or special community or diversities of interest, as permitted by the governing legislation.

The Commission is mandated to produce an interim report of new provincial constituency boundaries within three months of being formed. It may then hold public hearings before tabling a final report with the Legislative Assembly three months after the interim report.

THE COMMISSION’S WORK

Establishing the Commission

The Constituency Boundaries Commission was established on April 27, 2022. The Honourable Justice Donald Layh was appointed chairperson by the Lieutenant Governor in Council following his nomination by the Chief Justice of Saskatchewan, pursuant to Section 5(2)(b) of *The Constituency Boundaries Act, 1993* (hereafter referred to as “the Act”). Joe Donlevy and Frank Quennell were appointed as members of the Commission by the Lieutenant Governor in Council after consultation with the leader of the opposition in the Legislative Assembly.

The Commission has carried out its work throughout the process under the provisions of the Act. In keeping with these provisions, Dr. Michael Boda, Chief Electoral Officer of Saskatchewan was appointed Secretary to the Commission, providing logistical support for the Commission’s work. Further, the Commission first met in early May to adopt a schedule for its redistricting sessions and for public hearings. The redistricting sessions were conducted in June and were facilitated by the Commission secretary and the staff at Elections Saskatchewan.

North-South Dividing Line

Section 12 of the Act directs the Commission to prepare a report containing the Commission’s recommendations respecting constituency boundaries for the 59 constituencies lying south of the northern dividing line. Additionally, the Commission is directed to provide boundary descriptions for each of the 59 proposed constituencies and the proposed name for each constituency.

The “dividing line” referred to is defined by Section 2(e) of the Act as follows:

“**dividing line**” means the line that:

- (i) divides Saskatchewan into a northern area and southern area; and
- (ii) is described in the Schedule to this *Act*.

A map illustrating the dividing line is included in this report as Appendix A.

Constituency Population Quotient

Provincial boundaries are to be drawn in reference to a constituency population quotient. Section 13(1) of the Act reads:

- (1) In preparing its report respecting proposed constituencies south of the dividing line, a commission shall establish a constituency population quotient in accordance with subsection (2).
- (2) The constituency population quotient is to be calculated in accordance with the following formula:

$$CPQ = \frac{TP - NP}{59}$$

Where:

CPQ is the constituency population quotient;

TP is the total population; and

NP is the northern population.

The total population is defined by the Act as "... the total population of Saskatchewan that is 18 years of age or older as determined pursuant to the census that a commission is established to consider." The northern population is defined by the Act as "... that part of the total population which is north of the dividing line as estimated by a commission."

The Commission is required by Section 3(10) of the Act to base its report on the 2021 census. The rules for drafting constituency boundaries are defined in subsection 14(1) of the Act:

- (1) Subject to subsections (2) and (3), in determining the area to be included in a proposed constituency south of the dividing line and in fixing the boundaries of that constituency, a commission shall ensure that the population of each proposed constituency is, as nearly as possible, equal to the constituency population quotient.
- (2) A commission may depart from the requirements of subsection (1) where, in its opinion, it is necessary to do so because of:
 - (a) special geographic considerations, including:
 - (i) sparsity, density or relative rates of growth of population in various regions south of the dividing line;
 - (ii) accessibility to the regions mentioned in subclause (i); or
 - (iii) the size and shape of the regions described in subclause (i);
 - (b) a special community of interests or diversity of interests of persons residing in regions south of the dividing line; or
 - (c) physical features of regions south of the dividing line.
- (3) A commission shall ensure that the population of each constituency south of the dividing line remains within 5%, either more or less, of the constituency population quotient.

The demographic data which includes those persons who are 18 years of age or older first became available from Statistics Canada on April 27, 2022. The Clerk of Executive Council advised the Chairperson of the Commission on May 20, 2022 of the total population of 867,855.

Applying the formula above, the constituency population quotient was calculated as follows:

$$CPQ = \frac{867,855 - 23,823}{59}$$

$$CPQ = 14,306$$

Therefore, a 5% variance over and under the quotient would mean that all constituencies would have to have a population between 13,590 and 15,021.

As can be seen from the following table of the Constituencies as they existed prior to the Commission's work, a number of adjustments were required to ensure populations were within the 5% variance prescribed by the Act.

 - Review the effect of your solutions on neighbouring proposed constituencies
- Indicate the political, financial, or other interest of the person making the submission; and
- Indicate if you wish to appear and be heard at the public hearing


