



To vote in a Saskatchewan provincial election, you must be:



a Canadian



at least 18 years old



a Saskatchewan resident for six months before the election is called.

Register to vote

If you are not already registered, you must register before you vote, in advance or at the voting place.



Option 1
Before going to vote,
register online at
elections.sk.ca/register.



Option 2
When you go to vote,
register in person.
You must show your ID.

Voter Information Card

Voters who are already registered will receive a voter information card in the mail. This card lists your voting place locations, dates, and times.




Identification (ID)

Before you are handed a ballot at a voting place, you must show the election worker ID that confirms your name and address. You have three options for this.

Option 1

Driver's licence or non-driver photo ID.

These cards have your name and address. One of them is all you need.



Option 2

Two pieces of ID.


Both must show your name. At least one must show your address. Common pieces are a health card, photo ID card, student card, utility bill, or bank statement. There are more than 50 pieces of ID options. A complete list is online at www.elections.sk.ca/id.



Option 3

No ID.

An eligible voter who knows you and lives in your constituency may vouch for you at the voting place. A voter can only vouch for one other individual.



Ways to Vote.

More ways to vote. You only vote once, but you have more options for when and where to vote.

Option 1

Voting Week.

Locations, days, and times are listed on your voter information card, or go to www.elections.sk.ca. Designated parking spaces will be available for voters with disabilities. Bring your ID.

Vote at one of the locations listed on your voter information card. It may be a mall, library, community hall, church, or school. Designated parking spaces will be available for voters with disabilities. Voting places will have level entrances wide enough for wheelchairs, with good lighting and signage. Bring your ID.

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Option 2

Voting by Mail.

A convenient option to voters, any eligible voter can vote by mail before Voting Week. Apply starting in June 2024 at www.elections. sk.ca/votebymail. When your application is accepted, a ballot kit will be mailed to your residence after the election begins. Follow the instructions carefully. When completed, mail the ballot kit back to Elections Saskatchewan before the last day to vote.



Option 3

Homebound Voting.

If you are unable to leave your home, you can arrange to have an election worker come to your home. You and your caregiver can both cast a ballot.



Option 4

Voting in a Recognized Facility.

Voting in a hospital, personal care home, or remand facility is normally for residents only and not for the walk-in public.



Voting is easy!

Here is what happens when you vote inside a voting place in the 2024 Provincial Election.

An election worker will ask to see ID that proves your name and address. If you do not have ID, vouching may be an option.



Take the folded ballot you are given and go behind the voting screen for privacy.



Unfold the ballot. Mark an X next to the name of one candidate. If you make a mistake, ask an election worker to get you a new ballot.



After voting, re-fold your ballot. Keep your choice a secret. Do not show anyone who you voted for. Do not take a photo of your ballot, and do not share it on the internet.



An election worker will show you the box to drop the ballot in.



If you need help, ask an election worker. Magnifying sheets, LED lights, and ballot templates are available if needed. If you need help reading the ballot, you can use your own mobile device.
